Saint George Orthodox Church



What does it mean to "serve out of love?" This question was answered on Friday, 20 November 2015, when the children of Saint George Orthodox Church School in Buffalo NY came together with their parents and teachers under the guidance of Father Jason Vansuch (parish rector) to learn what it means to help and serve others during this season of the Nativity Fast. In wanting the children to get more involved with the parish outreach ministry, Church School Coordinators (Matushka Katia Vansuch and

Natalie Huett) contacted the "Family Help Center," a local non-profit organization that helps build stronger families by caring for the needs of children and providing support to the entire family.

The Family Help Center has been providing services to families since 1973, focusing on providing children the support they need. Family Help Center is the only 24-hour, 365-day-a-year family crisis intervention and support service in Erie County, New York. It is a multi-service agency providing in-home support services and licensed daycare facility services.

Coming together on the Eve of the Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple during the Nativity Fast and in preparation for Thanksgiving, the children and adults served the Service of "Little Compline" followed by a Thanksgiving Meal (minus the turkey, since it is a fasting period, so they had fish instead) prepared by the parents. After enjoying the delicious meal and fellowship, Father Jason gave a brief talk on the meaning of Thanksgiving and why it is important to help those who may be less fortunate than we.

Following a brief introduction by Natalie Huett, the children were divided into two groups. The older kids, under the direction of the parents and teachers, got to work on preparing posters listing items that the Family Help Center is in most dire need of and that will therefore be collected on an ongoing basis throughout the year. The younger children worked on making the gift tags which were then hung on the giving tree in the parish fellowship hall. Each tag listed the name, age and Christmas wish of a specific child from the Family Help Center. On the following Sunday, during coffee hour, Matushka Katia gave a brief presentation to our parishioners on the Sunday School outreach project. Parishioners were then encouraged to pick a gift tag from the giving tree and help make one special boy or girl's Christmas wish come true.

"By the Grace of God and everyone's generosity," said Father Jason, "by the end of the coffee hour all the gift tags were taken! We are so blessed to be able to truly fulfill the words of our Lord in the Gospel of Saint Matthew:"

Diocese of Alaska Assembly emphasizes centrality of stewardship ANCHORAGE, AK [Diocese of Alaska Communications]

Clergy and lay delegates from as far as Atka Island in the Aleutian Chain, Fairbanks near the Arctic Circle, and elsewhere across the state of Alaska gathered at Saint Innocent Cathedral here November 6-8, 2015 for the annual Assembly of the Diocese of Alaska.

During the opening services, which coincided with the celebration of Saint Demetrius Memorial Saturday, His Grace, Bishop David especially remembered in prayer Matushka Olga Michael, who fell asleep in the Lord on November 8, 1979, together with the diocese's faithful departed.

In his opening address, Bishop David emphasized the importance parish tithes play in supporting the work of the diocese. "The next year—the 'Year of the Steward'—will be dedicated to all of us growing in our understanding of stewardship and how we should apply it," he said. He also spoke of the need for ongoing support for Saint Herman's Seminary, which provides full scholarships for all Alaskan students.

Bishop David went on to highlight the stewardship various agencies have displayed in making various ministries and missionary efforts in Alaska possible. The Florida-based Orthodox Christian Mission Center [OCMC] provides support for two missionary families in the diocese—Priest David and Matushka Rozanne Rucker, who minister at Saint Herman's Seminary and within the wider Kodiak community, and Hosea and Pamela DiLullo and their family, who assist the diocese in a variety of capacities through their construction company and religious education efforts. He also expressed gratitude for the many OCMC summer mission teams that help in the villages. International Orthodox Christian Charities was cited for providing training for clergy and seminarians in the area of drug and alcohol counselor training, books for school children, and furniture for the seminary. ROSSIA—the "Russian Orthodox Sacred Sites in Alaska" organization under the leadership of Chugach CEO Sherri Buretta—has provided unmatched assistance in rebuilding and preserving the historic churches in Kenai, Juneau, Unalaska, Chuathbaluk, Tatitlek, Sitka, Karluk and elsewhere.

Bishop David also reported that the Holy Synod of Bishops had appointed him to the Orthodox Church in America's Canonization Commission while sharing the work he has undertaken researching Matushka Olga's life. He also spoke of the ongoing effort to locate the grave of Saint Jacob Netsvetov.

Three invited speakers addressed Assembly delegates. Archpriest John Jillions, OCA Chancellor, spoke on the importance of complying with the OCA's Policies, Standards and Procedures on Sexual Misconduct and Best Practices, aired a photo presentation about the OCA Chancery, and fielded a variety of questions from the floor. Dan Christopulos, IOCC's US Country Representative, reported on his work

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in assessing diocesan and parish needs for which the agency might offer assistance. In the summer of 2015, he and Gregory Manzuk, IOCC's Senior Programs Manager, traveled across Alaska to speak with tribal and religious leaders in an effort to gather information on the struggles facing all Alaskans, and especially Native Alaskans. Michael Herzak from the Cleveland, OH-based Guide One Insurance spoke on the various types of coverage needed by churches and explained the liabilities involved in each situation. Churches in Alaska are largely under-insured and at risk.

In related news, it was announced that the blessing cross of Saint Herman of Alaska, damaged during the break-in at Kodiak's Holy Resurrection Cathedral in June 2015, has been fully restored through the metalworking skills of the cathedral's Deacon Innocent Philo.



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The Holy Martyr Paramon and the 370 Martyrs with him suffered for their faith in Christ in the year 250 during the rule of the emperor Decius (249-251). The governor of the Eastern regions, Aquianus, had locked up 370 Christians in prison, urging them to abjure Christ and instead offer sacrifice to idols.

They subjected the captives to beatings, hoping by torture and the threat of death to persuade them to renounce Christ and worship the pagan gods. One of the local inhabitants, Paramon by name, openly denounced the cruel governor and confessed his faith in the One True God, the Lord Jesus Christ. They beheaded St Paramon after fierce tortures, together with the other 370 martyrs.

Prayers by the Lake, St. Nikolai Velimirovich, XXXIII:

My hope awaits You, Lord.

Expecting You is the only content and meaning of my Tomorrow and the Day after Tomorrow.

The grass expects the dew and is not disappointed. The mountain expects the thunder, and is not disappointed. The mole in the ground expects its meal, and is not disappointed. You fulfill the expectations of all beings. I am expecting You, and You are coming to meet me. With the same haste that I am approaching You, You are coming toward me.

What is Tomorrow, children of earth, except your hope. If you eradicate all your hope, your desire to see Tomorrow dawn will die.

Do not grumble against Heaven because It does not fulfill all your hopes. Grumble against yourselves, because you do not know how to hope. Heaven does not fulfill hopes but hope. The most sublime and steadfast hope Heaven always fulfills. Do not grumble against Heaven because It does not see the benefits for your family and your factions and enter into your intrigues against one another. Heaven is discerning and merciful. It is discerning for anything good in any faction, and is merciful towards your infirmity, provided that good will accompanies it.

My hope is not an inkling but a certainty that You will come. You promised, and I bear the seal of Your promise in my soul. If You have not come yet, it is not Your fault but mine. You are tender and compassionate, and would not wish to make me ashamed of mv Therefore, unpreparedness. You approach slowly, and continuously announce Your coming.

Hopelessness sits idle. But my hope cleans and washes continuously; it airs out and censes the quarters where it will receive You. And it frets day and night lest it forget anything whatsoever that might be pleasing to You. And it continuously calls upon the angels and the saints, the mystery-seers, to show it how to make its cave like Heaven.

My hope has no other partners. I have chased out of myself all other hopes as proven imposters. And now in their place there sprouts only one hope, which awaits You.

When You come You will bring me the richest gifts. With You, O Victorious One, will come my victory over all boredoms and worries. With You will come light, and health, and strength, and wisdom and the complete fulfillment of all human expectations from the beginning to the end of time.

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In truth, the people with many hopes, that exclude You, sit on the mountain and wait for the sun to rise from the West.

But I stand facing the East, and I know for certain that the sun will soon be born. For I see the dawn becoming rosy.

Others plant dry rods in the ground, and hope for greenery and fruit. But over my field I sowed living seed, which is turning green and bearing fruit.

My hope in You is not a myth but a certaintyas certain as the fact that the sun must rise from the East and that good seed, when sown on good soil, must sprout.

The field is Yours, and You are the sower and the seed.

Come, O Lord, my hope awaits You!

(Fear of Offending God With One's Sins)

Whoever fears God stands above all manner of fear. He has become a stranger to all the fear of this world and placed it far from himself, and no manner of trembling comes near him.

The Prologue of Ohrid St. Nikolai Velimirovic

1. The Holy Martyr Paramon and 370 others with Him

In Asian Bithynia, Governor Aquilinus fiercely persecuted Christians. Once, he captured 370 Christians, brought them with him, and bound them at a place where there was an idolatrous temple of the god Poseidon. Here, the wicked governor tried to force them to worship and offer sacrifice to the idol. Even though the governor threatened death for anyone who did not obey his order, not a single Christian submitted. Just then, a respected man by the name of Paramon passed along the road beside the temple. He stopped beside the masses of shackled people and learned what was happening. Then he cried out: "Oh, how many innocent righteous ones does this foul governor desire to slaughter, because they will not worship his dead and mute idols?" Paramon then continued on his way, and the infuriated governor sent his servants to slay him. The servants caught up to Paramon, seized him and pierced his tongue with a thorn, then stripped him naked and stabbed his entire body. Holy Paramon, with prayer in his heart, gave up his soul to God. After that, the 370 martyrs, great as sons of God and innocent as lambs, were beheaded and thus entered into the Immortal Kingdom of Christ the Lord. They suffered in the year 250 A.D.

2. The Venerable Acacius of Sinai

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In his famous book, The Ladder, St. John Climacus relates the life of this saint. The young Acacius was a novice under an evil elder in the monastery on Sinai. The irascible elder daily reproached and insulted Acacius and often beat, tormented and maltreated him in every possible way. However, Acacius did not complain but endured this all patiently, with the assurance that it was beneficial for his salvation. Whenever anyone asked him how he was doing, he replied: "Well, as before the Lord God!" After nine years of obedience and torment, Acacius died. The elder buried him and then expressed sorrow to another elder saying: "Acacius, my disciple died." "I do not believe it," replied the holy elder, "Acacius did not die." Then both of them went to the grave of the dead man and that holy elder cried out: "Brother Acacius, did you die?" Acacius, obedient even after death replied: "Father, I have not died, for it is impossible for an obedient one to die." Then, the evil elder repented and shut himself in a cell near Acacius's grave where, in repentance and prayer, he spent the remainder of his life.

3. The Holy Martyr Dionysius, Bishop of Corinth

He was an eminent pastor and teacher. He was beheaded for Christ in the year 182 A.D.

4. Saint Tiridates, King of Armenia

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Tiridates was a contemporary of Diocletian. At first, he furiously persecuted Christians, but God's punishment befell him and he went insane and became like a beast, as had happened to King Nebuchadnezzar. Tiridates was miraculously healed of his insanity by St. Gregory of Armenia (September 30). From then until his death, Tiridates spent his life in repentance and devotion. He died peacefully in the fourth century.

5. The Holy Martyr Apollonius

Apollonius was a Roman senator. Accused because of his faith in Christ, he confessed it before the entire senate, for which he was beheaded with the sword in Rome in the year 186 A.D.

> **Hymn of Praise** The Venerable Acacius of Sinai

The elder summoned his novice: "Brother Acacius, where are you?" The elder called once more: "Acacius, are you dead?" "No, Father, I am not dead," The monk humbly replied, "For him who faithfully obeys, There is no death." The irascible elder was amazed, Amazed, and began to weep. The elder bitterly wept, And repented of his wickedness. Why does the cruel elder repent? Truly, he has a reason. Into the wilderness, the sinner went To atone for his evil. Acacius, the wondrous monk, By obedience, saved his soul; And his soul now rejoices, And his name is glorified.

Reflection

God's punishment often befalls sinners immediately after the sin, that the sinners may fear and the righteous be encouraged. However, sometimes it falls much later, suddenly and unexpectedly, that sinners may know that God forgets nothing. Dathan and Abiram were

A gravely ill soldier was brought to St. Stephen the New to be healed by him through prayer. Stephen told him to venerate the icons of Christ and the Holy Theotokos. The solider did this and was immediately restored to health, and this miracle was spoken of everywhere. Hearing of this, the iconoclastic Emperor Constantine Copronymus summoned this soldier and questioned him. When the soldier confessed that he received healing from the holy icons, the emperor reproached him with fury for The frightened venerating them. soldier repudiated the veneration of icons before the emperor and grew ashamed of his faith in them. When the soldier left the court and mounted his horse, the horse went wild under him, threw him off and trampled him with its hooves until he gave up his soul. Behold: a punishment immediately following sin.

King Tiridates, a persecutor of Christians, threw St. Gregory into a pit and killed thirty-seven holy nuns, but no punishment befell him. Later, when the king and his companions went hunting for pleasure, he and his entourage were seized by sudden madness. The reason for his madness and the means to restore him were revealed to his pious sister in a dream. St. Gregory was taken out of the pit, and by his prayers King Tiridates became healthy, repented and was baptized.

Punishment sometimes quickly follows sin as the day follows the night, yet sometimes slowly, as year follows year. But it never fails to come, except where repentance takes the place of punishment.

Contemplation

Contemplate God's wonderful Paradise (Genesis 2):

- 1. How God adorned Paradise with every kind of tree pleasant to the sight and good for food;
- 2. How God planted the Tree of Life in the midst of Paradise;

Homily: on the Church's compact structure, similar to a body

From whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part (Ephesians 4:16).

This word, brethren, is on the spiritual body, God's holy Church. From Him, that is, from Christ, the whole body is fitly joined together and compacted. The most wise Apostle cannot find a better comparison for the Church than the human body. What the head is to the human body, so is Christ the Lord to the body of the Church. From the head, the nerves spread through all parts of the body, and through the nerves, all the parts of the body perceive, feel and move; and their life lies in this perception, feeling and movement. It can be said that the head, through the brain and the nerves, is present in every part of the body. If the head is cut off, every part of the body becomes dead in an instant. Christ is present in every part of the Church, in every faithful member of it. Through Him, each of the faithful perceives the spiritual kingdom, feels love and moves aright toward God. From Him, every member receives strength according to the effectual working in the measure, that is, according to function and gift. The Lord gives this strength directly, by contact, by touch, by His personal presence. Love is a wonderful bond that binds Christ to the faithful, the faithful to Christ and the faithful to one another. Brethren, what happens to one part of the body when it is torn away from the nerves that link it to the head? It becomes inactive. insensitive and motionless: dead. This also happens with every member of the Church who leaves the structure of the Church, and thus severs his tie with the Head of the Church. Brethren, may God preserve us from this calamity!

O Lord Jesus, the Source of life and love, do not allow any dark power, within us or without us, to separate us from Thee and Thy Body, Thy Holy Church that Thou hast purchased with Thy precious blood.

To Thee be glory and praise forever. Amen.

Thoughts for Each Day of the Year According to the Daily Church Readings from the Word of God By St. Theophan the Recluse

Having spoken the parable about the man who became rich and planned to just eat, drink and be merry, and for this was struck with death, not remaining alive for the supposed pleasures, the Lord concluded: So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God. "So"that is, such occurs, or such a lot befalls both these and others. Those who become rich and forget about God only think about pleasures of the flesh. Let those who desire to avoid this bitter lot "lay up" not "unto themselves, but be rich only toward God." Since riches come from God, then devote them to God when they flow, and holy riches will come of it. Divide all surplus with the needy: this will be the same as returning to God what was given by God. He who gives to a poor person gives to God. Seemingly exhausting his riches, such a person becomes truly rich—rich through good deeds, rich for God. In pleasing Him he becomes rich in God, and by attracting His good will, he becomes rich from God, Who makes one who is faithful over a few things, ruler over many things. He becomes rich toward God, and not toward himself, for he does not consider himself to be master of the house, but only a steward and accountant, whose entire concern consists of satisfying all who come to him in need. But he fears spending anything in particular on himself, considering it to be an improper usage of property entrusted to him.

Suffering The role of suffering in the salvation of human kind

Elder Ambrose of Optina Monastery said, "We should not forget that in our age of 'sophistication' even little children are spiritually harmed by what they see and hear. As a result, purification is required, and this is only accomplished through bodily suffering....You must understand that Paradisal bliss is granted to no one without suffering."

A person has salvation not only by his good deeds, but also by his patient suffering of various griefs, illnesses, misfortunes, loss, and failures (Luke 16:19-31, Mark 8:31-38, Romans 6:3-11, Hebrews 12:1-3, and Galatians 6:14). Jesus Christ gives us the power which is needed for transformation, and prepares us to live with a strength under the most difficult conditions, preparing us for the peace that is eternal.

Heaven and Hell are a condition of relationship with God that is either theosis or perdition. The lake of fire and heaven occur within the same realm, both being not about places, but about relationship. For one who hates God such a place as in the presence of God, will be eternal suffering. The Orthodox Church teaches that Heaven and Hell are in the same realm, and that Hell is not separation from God symbolically or physically, Hell is a place chosen.

Without suffering, we cannot join ourselves to the cross, and when we do take up our cross in suffering, it is with our Co-Suffering Saviour. Sickness and suffering are not given to us by a wrathful and punitive God because we have sinned, but rather allowed by this loving God who co-suffers with us. It is Western juridical misconceptions concerning sin which has tended to distort a proper recognition of suffering and its connection to sin. With love in Christ, Abbot Tryphon

Praying for Others

"When they came to the place called The Skull, there they crucified him and the criminals, one on the right and the other on the left. But Jesus was saying, 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Lk 23: 33-34)

Here, from His cross, the Lord demonstrates to me the ultimate form of self-giving: Despite His own, extreme suffering, He expresses concern for others, praying for them. For Christ, this historical moment, when He hangs on the cross for the life of the world, is not "all about Him." When it comes to my own little cross-carrying journey today, I am reminded not to make it all "about me." It is a quiet form of self-giving that helps me not only to move out of self-centeredness, but also to place God and His will in the center of my relationship with others.
