

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Gospel: Matthew 18:23-35

The Lord said this parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the reckoning, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents; and as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him the lord of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. But that same servant, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat he said, 'Pay what you owe.' So his fellow servant fell down and besought him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' He refused and went and put him in prison till he should pay the debt. When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you besought me; and should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord delivered him to the jailers, till he should pay all his debt. So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."



#### Hieromartyr Babylas the Bishop of Antioch

The Hieromartyr Babylas and with him the three youths Urban, Prilidian, Epolonius and their mother Christodoula died as martyrs under the emperor Decius (249-251). During his stay in their city of Antioch, the emperor arranged for a large festival in honor of the pagan gods.

At the same time, Babylas, the holy and God-fearing Bishop of Antioch, was serving the Divine Liturgy in church. He prayed for his flock and taught them to endure all tribulations for Christ with courage. The idolater Decius, curious to witness the Divine Mysteries, decided to enter the church.

News of this reached the bishop, so he went out to meet Decius and blocked the path to the church, for he was unwilling to permit impiety in the temple of God. When the emperor approached the church doors, St Babylas refused to let him enter, so the emperor had to abandon his intention. He wanted to take revenge on the saint right away, but when he saw the large throng of Christians, he feared they might riot.

The next day the angry emperor ordered that the church be set on fire, and for Bishop Babylas to be brought before him. When asked why he had insulted the imperial dignity by not allowing the emperor to enter the church, the holy bishop answered, "Anyone who would rise up against God and want to desecrate His sanctuary, is not worthy of respect, but has become the enemy of the Lord."

Decius declared that the holy bishop must worship the idols in order to make up for his lack of respect for the emperor, or else face execution. After convincing himself that the martyr would remain steadfast in his faith, he commanded the military commander Victorinus to put him in heavy chains and lead him through the city in disgrace. The holy martyr replied, "Emperor, these chains are as venerable for me as your imperial crown is for you. For me, suffering for Christ is as desirable as the imperial power is for you. Death for the Immortal King is as precious to me as your life is to you."

At the trial with Bishop Babylas were three young brothers, who did not forsake him even in this most difficult moment. Seeing them, the emperor asked, "Who are these children?"

"These are my spiritual children," the saint replied, "and I have raised them in piety, I have given them an education, cultivated them with guidance, and here before you in a small body are these great young men and perfect Christians. Test them and see."

The emperor tried in all sorts of ways to entice the youths and their mother Christodoula to renounce Christ, but in vain. Then, in a rage, he ordered each of them to be whipped with a number of blows corresponding to their age. The first received twelve blows, the second, ten, and the third, seven. Dismissing the mother and children, the torturer again summoned the bishop, telling him that the children had renounced Christ. He did not believe the lie, however.

Then he commanded all the martyrs be tied to a tree and burned with fire. Seeing the stoic bravery of the saints, the emperor finally condemned them to be beheaded with the sword.

#### SVOTS to host panel discussion on sacred arts September 17

On Saturday, September 17, 2016, at 7:00 p.m., Saint Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary [SVOTS] here will host a panel discussion titled "Rethinking Sacred Arts." The event, which is open to the public, will feature eleven renowned international scholars and artists and draw upon their expertise in the study, practice, and interpretation of the visual arts, music, rhetoric, and aesthetics.

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The panel discussion will top off a weekend-long "Sacred Arts Symposium," which is the first in a series of events planned between fall 2016 and spring 2018 by the seminary, all of which are a part of its Sacred Arts Initiative [SAI]. SAI events are funded by a grant from the Henry Luce Foundation and are designed to explore the seminary's contribution to the study and practice of the sacred arts.

The prestigious panel will include Father Ivan Moody, Universidade Nova de Lisboa; Gordon Graham, Princeton Theological Seminary; Helen Evans, the Metropolitan Museum of Art; Vasileios Marinis, Yale Divinity School; George Kordis, the University of Athens; Christina Maranci, Tufts University; Annemarie Weyl Carr, Southern Methodist University [Emerita]; Peter Jeffery and Margot Fassler, University of Notre Dame; Judith Wolfe, Saint Andrew's, Scotland; and Mary Carruthers, New York University [Emerita]. Peter C. Bouteneff, Professor of Systematic Theology at Saint Vladimir's and SAI Director, will introduce the discussion.

The event will be held in the Metropolitan Philip Auditorium of the John G. Rangos Family Building. Admission is free.

#### Study Guide on Caring for Creation ideal for new school year

September 1 marks the beginning of the ecclesiastical year, but since the late 1980s, it also has been observed as the "Day of Prayer for Creation." Within this context, "The Earth is the Lord's: Caring for God's Creation" — a five-session study guide originally published by the Orthodox Church in America in 1995 and reissued in 2015 — makes an ideal curriculum resource for the opening of the new Church school year.

"The Earth is the Lord's" addresses stewardship of creation in conjunction with the Day of Prayer. The resource is available free of charge in PDF format, along with a poster highlighting the Day of Prayer. The study resource, written and edited by Archpriest Michael Anderson, Matushka Barbara Kucynda, the late Dr. Constance Tarasar and others, has been widely used over the years in Church school, camping and vacation Bible school programs.

It was on September 1, 1989, that His All-Holiness, the late Ecumenical Patriarch Demetrios I issued the first message from the Ecumenical Throne on the environment and proclaimed the first day of the ecclesiastical year as a Day of Prayer for Creation.



#### Orthodox Community Action Teams Assist in Flood-Ravaged Louisiana

Baltimore, MD (IOCC) — More than 40,000 homes have been damaged after powerful floods swept across much of Baton Rouge last month. The race to clean homes before mold and other health hazards set in is a challenge as more hands are needed to help in the short-term response and long-term recovery. Orthodox Christian volunteers organized by International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) are rallying to their neighbors in need with cleanup assistance in affected communities.

IOCC Community Action volunteers of all ages, many from New Orleans, have been working tirelessly over the past few weeks, helping clean out the flood-damaged Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church, and assisting people in the communities surrounding Baton Rouge rip out waterlogged walls and cabinets, pull up soaked carpet, and throw away family furniture and possessions that were beyond saving.

Phone: 856-227-6915 Email: docandrn1@verizon.net E-Mail us at: ChurchMotherOfGod@outlook.com Memories of the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina more than ten years ago are still vivid for New Orleans resident, Dimitri Poulos, 40, and his son, Andreas, 14, who came out to volunteer. "I will never forget the destruction to our house and all around me. Our family home was left without walls," said Dimitri. He also remembers the kindness of strangers who helped his family clean up after the disaster, prompting him to take time off from the family restaurant business and drive two hours with his son to offer their assistance to distressed families. "A lot of people of Baton Rouge aren't getting the help they need like we did after Hurricane Katrina. I know what a difference it made for us, and this is my chance to pay it forward."

The clean-up efforts by Orthodox Christian volunteers have been warmly welcomed, but the needs in Baton Rouge are still great as flood survivors face the slow and costly path to recovery, according to IOCC US Country Representative Dan Christopulos. "The outpouring of support and willingness to help has been tremendous, especially in offering to help people in the community," he said. Along with the volunteer clean-up crews, 1,000 school kits and 500 clean-up buckets provided by Orthodox Christians and ecumenical partners have been distributed to Louisiana flood victims in six counties.

"We encourage Orthodox volunteers to continue to assist in the recovery with local IOCC relief partners once we leave the area. The most effective way that people who are not able to offer hands-on help but wish to support these efforts is by making a financial contribution or by assembling kits," added Christopulos.

Many areas affected around Baton Rouge were not thought to be at high risk for flooding. The flooding and natural disasters are a reminder to all families to be prepared for disasters and have a family emergency plan. Severe summer weather has left a path of destruction across the US. In addition to the Louisiana flood relief, IOCC and Orthodox Christian volunteers around the country have also responded to their neighbors in need with cleanup assistance in the aftermath of floods in West Virginia, Missouri and Minnesota.

#### The Objective Reality of God

How do we discover God in an unbelieving world?

God is a merciful God, quick to forgive, quick to show mercy, quick to embrace us when we turn to Him. In all of eternity our God chose to create humankind in His image and likeness, offering His creatures the opportunity to commune with Him in the endlessness that is time. He's given us free will, allowing us to choose, or not to choose, a

relationship with Him. We, in our freedom, can choose between good (God) and evil (Satan), as is our choice.

We can usually tell the difference between good and evil. Murder and theft are obviously to be found in the evil camp, whereas kindness, philanthropic deeds, mercy and love, are in the camp of holiness, and the divine. Yet so many feel that God is simply a myth, a nice idea, but hardly believable. If this God they'd like to believe in were truly real, wouldn't He make it easier to see Him, and seek Him out? If we are free to choose God, why doesn't He make Himself easier to find? Why does this God expect us to believe in Him when we cannot see Him, or feel Him? If there be a God, why doesn't He simply make Himself known, letting us choose or not choose communion with Him?

These are questions that many people pose, at least to themselves. Many want to believe there is a God who cares for them, and is capable of making a difference in their day to day struggles, but just can't quite surrender to belief. The nihilistic philosophy that has possessed the hearts of many young people today is based on the despair of an age that has seen so many wars, so much poverty, so many murders, so many children abused, and a seemingly

hopeless future. How can there be a God when so much suffering abounds in this world? How can there be a God when even innocent people, good people, suffer?

Where is God? He is in the sunrise. He is in the glorious mountains, and the vast sea that stretches beyond the horizon. He is in the tender touch of a mother's hand on her newborn baby. He is in the protective arm of the police officer who comforts the lost child. He is in the words of absolution pronounced by the priest after a good confession. He is in the smiling face of an old woman at the site of a young couple holding hands. He is in the wonder of the cosmos on a darkened night. He is in the giggle of a small child playing with his grandfather. He is in the warmth of a kitten held in one's hand. He is in the cross that bore the Son of Man. He is in the bread and wine that become His Body and Blood. He is the transforming Spirit that changes hearts and makes men saints. He is closer to us than our own breath, more loving than a grandmother's embrace of a sick child. He is everywhere, for there is no place He cannot be. He fills all things. He is everywhere to be seen if only we look with open eyes and open hearts.

# **Daily Reflection**I Walk The Line

"'If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he will give you another Counselor, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him



nor knows him; you know him, for he dwells with you, and will be in you. I will not leave you desolate; I will come to you." (In 14: 15-18)

I thought of this passage recently, not because I was reading the Gospel, but because I was listening to a song by Johnny Cash, "...because you're mine, I walk the line."

Is that strange, to be led to Scripture from a song by Johnny Cash? No, I don't think so. After all, if the High-Priest Caiaphas, an important voice of his time, was given to prophesy about our Lord's redemptive death (Jn 11: 49-52), then great artists of our time can give voice to vital truths about us; e.g., about the nature of human love and its consequences, like mindfulness and obedience: "I keep a close watch on this heart of mine," says Johnny Cash, "I keep my eyes wide open all the time..."

It's my imperfect, human love that our Lord appeals to, when He says to me: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." And He says this to all of us, just before His arrest and trial, when most of us scattered and left Him desolate: "I will not leave you desolate..." Because His perfect, divine love is willing to make perfect my imperfect, human kind: "I will pray the Father, and he will give you another Counselor..."

So let me embrace His love for me today, as He embraces mine, despite its imperfections. He sends me "another Counselor" despite my betrayals to "other" counselors, time and again.
